What we do: Neil works as a surgeon at the local government hospital in Moyo and Sue as a lecturer at Kajokeji Christian College (KCC).

Greetings!

Thank you for your prayer and support – the sun is shining through the rainstorms and we are doing better!

The roads are still muddy but on the whole I (Sue) am doing well and haven't got stuck, only slid around a bit! And the one day there was a barrier and a problem, a colleague arrived promptly travelling in the opposite direction to rescue me. Thank you God – his angels take many shapes and forms. I am enjoying interacting with the students and particularly the apologetics course I am lecturing.

A new opportunity to serve in the local prison has opened up and that has been very exciting. I am helping with services on a Sunday and Bible study in the week. The prison is very basic, tatty yellow clothes, shared sleeping quarters where they sleep on thin mattresses on the floor and only one meal a day, but very welcoming and friendly. Many of the 100 or so men are asking for prayer and eager to read the Bible. The five women inmates are also welcoming, but their English is poor so my colleague, Teacher Grace from St Paul's, joins me to talk to them in Madi. Please pray for wisdom for those of us teaching and for real transformation among the prisoners, indeed all of us.

Even Neil is feeling more positive – although consumables are still a problem, he has some good relationships at the hospital and the container from

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Rotary Australia and a delivery from the UK are due imminently. He has also discovered mountain biking on the local roads to replace his running, which he can no longer do due to a damaged knee. Please continue to pray for good relationships for Neil and his colleagues and the safe arrival of the equipment. We are hoping Paul (of CMS fame) may join us to help Neil get the equipment up and running.

Sunday school continues with a faithful team of teachers, but who quite often need to be elsewhere. So please pray for the team, for more members and for wisdom in how to grow the work and reach youngsters at different levels.

The big problem looming is Ebola, which has surfaced not far from us. Please pray for the health department to act wisely and swiftly. The World Health Organisation and Médecins Sans Frontières are both involved.

Once again, we are so grateful for your support and prayers.
