We examined the answers to identify the topics, ideas and patterns of meaning which came up repeatedly.




This time/ Now	De-centralising time. Distrust of power	Climate crisis	Time of confusion and fear	End times

There was a posture of anxiety and confession that echoed through this Gather tour. The times are dark and uncertain. Paradoxically, people were not looking for recitals of triumphal confession of what we know, but a humility and brave admission of this uncertainty. "We don't know what we don't know!"

There was a sense of being in a pivotal moment in time, a turning in the West... Away from old paradigms of an empirical understanding of a colonial God, mission and spirituality...Towards a yet known, native God, mission and spirituality.




Who are we?




The key word that cut across the inquiry is connection. From the chaos of times we live in, we hear the invitation to be connectors, we see God's presence in connections and are committed in making connections to cross over into a future horizon together.

We recognised that connections invite space to be curious, question, explore and experiment with who and where we see God.

We were invited to avoid the arrogance of Peter in his revelation of Jesus as Christ. To confess we don't always see Christ beyond the conditional pictures we have framed of him within the theological landscape we already know.










What shall we do now?



We heard the ancient call to pray, worship and serve. We also heard a prophetic voice of insurrection asking, 'yes but how?' We perceived the challenge to not simply do more. More intercessory prayer, more fervent worship and more radical acts of service - we recognise the misdirection of a consumer logic in this, that more will make us happy. There was an appeal to explore the darker contours of pilgrimage, critique the confessions of our faith and place into the furnace of inquiry the assumptions that shape our communities of practice. In this listening inquiry the incitement is to do less of the busyness of doing, explore a different way, that forms a new practice of being, good at doing good, better.
